Blasphemy Allegations, Legal Representation, and the Rule of Law: Reflections on the Mansehra Bar Decision

It requires that every individual—regardless of social status, religion, ethnicity, or the nature of the accusation affords equal protection under the law and access to a fair judicial process. Among the most fundamental principles of justice is the right of every accused person to legal representation. Without this safeguard, the administration of justice risks being influenced by public emotion rather than legal evidence.

In Pakistan, allegations of blasphemy often generate intense public attention and deep emotional responses. These cases are not only legal proceedings but also matters that can profoundly affect communities, institutions, and the administration of justice. This article reflects on the reported decision of the Mansehra Bar Association concerning legal representation in a blasphemy case and examines the broader implications for the rule of law and judicial independence.

The Right to Legal Representation
